

The Unity & Justice Restoration Act

Securing the Safety of Indigenous Families and Children

The Mission: To ensure that no American child—regardless of their heritage—is ever forgotten by the justice system. This Act establishes a collaborative bridge between major cities and Native Nations to provide the resources necessary to find the missing and uphold the constitutional right to equal protection under the law.

I. The “Safe Return” Fund: A Commitment to Action

This initiative establishes a dedicated **Restoration Fund** sourced from a 15% reinvestment of annual revenues from key regional hubs. These funds are redirected from administrative overhead into direct-impact community safety and specialized investigation.

II. Pillar One: The “No Child Left Behind” Recovery Initiative

Focus: Technology and specialized teams to bring children home.

- **Joint Recovery Task Forces:** Funding elite, cross-jurisdictional teams that combine the local knowledge of Tribal leaders with modern forensic technology to solve cold cases.
- **Precision Data Systems:** Upgrading old, manual record-keeping to a modern, digital “Gold Standard” system. This ensures every missing person is accurately identified and never lost in a paperwork error.
- **Immediate Response Networks:** Expanding “Silver” and “Amber” alert equivalents to ensure that when an Indigenous child goes missing, the entire region is notified instantly.

II. Pillar Two: The Equal Justice Legal Council

Focus: Professional advocacy and constitutional rights.

- **The Family Advocacy Program:** Providing families with dedicated legal guides to help them navigate the complex web of local, state, and tribal laws.
- **Closing Legal Loopholes:** Ensuring that crimes committed in “border towns” are prosecuted swiftly by removing the red tape that often prevents local and tribal police from working together.

III. Pillar Three: Strengthening Communities

Focus: Prevention and healing.

- **Community Safety Grants:** Investing in lighting, emergency kiosks, and safe-transit programs in areas identified as high-risk.
- **Healing & Wellness Centers:** Establishing trauma-informed care facilities that respect traditional Indigenous healing practices alongside modern medicine.

IV. Accountability to the Public

To ensure these funds are used effectively, a **Bipartisan Oversight Commission**—composed of Tribal Elders, law enforcement experts, and community advocates—will provide a transparent annual report to the public on how many lives were saved and how many cases were resolved.
